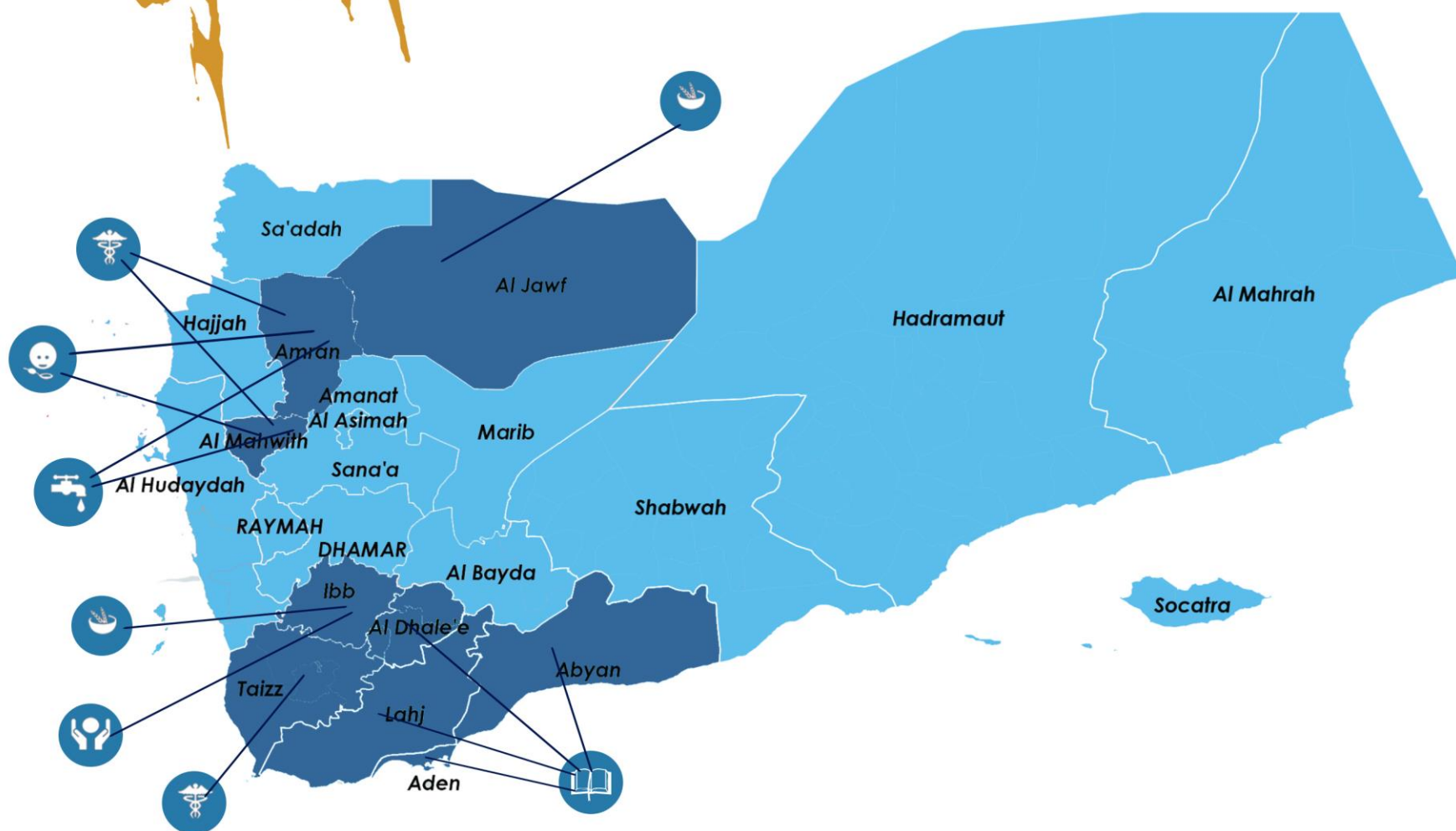
## Goals

- Contribute to strengthen the capacity of NGOs in all governorates to develop resources for beneficiaries-oriented programs and projects.



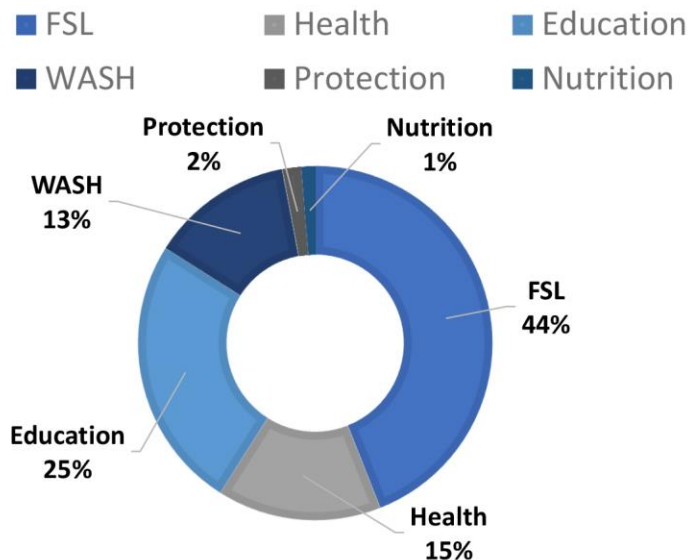

## Health Program



### Health Humanitarian Situation in Yemen

With only 51 per cent of health facilities fully functional, access to healthcare is severely limited. Lack of salaries for health personnel, damage to health facilities and difficulty importing medicines and medical supplies are all accelerating the decline of public health services. Mortality in famine is often driven by disease preying on weakened immune systems. Famine-risk districts are particularly vulnerable, as many children, mothers and people with illnesses or malnutrition in these areas may be unable to access healthcare. (HNO 2019)

The Humanitarian response plan of 2019 for the health cluster focused on 3 objectives; 1) Improve access to primary, secondary and tertiary health care including district hospitals in priority districts. 2) Help ensure that health facilities in priority districts are able to respond to epidemics and outbreaks. 3) Help restore functionality of the closed or damaged health facilities in high priority districts.

### Health Program in YDN

The health program in YDN has managed 6 health projects that supported 58 health facilities since January 2017. The interventions varied between providing primary health care, cholera response, providing secondary health care and rehabilitating health facilities.

YDN has supported health facilities with providing health workers with incentives, procuring medication and medical supplies, supporting referral, training health workers and supporting the operational costs to ensure functionality of the health facilities. Thus working within the objectives of the health cluster. The health program in YDN focuses on delivering a full package of services (Minimum service package) to ensure the infrastructure and workforce is supported to deliver quality health care independent of any other interventions.

### Health Projects in 2019

In 2019, YDN managed 3 health projects that supported 18 health facilities in 6 different districts in Yemen. The interventions included supporting primary health care and secondary health care which

The “*Emergency Cholera Response Project*” was a response to the cholera outbreak that reached 835,367 suspected cholera cases in 2019, YDN managed 2 diarrhea treatment centers and 10 oral rehydration corners in 2 districts of the cholera priority districts in Amran governorate. The project reached 8039 beneficiaries.

The “**Integrated Health, nutrition and WASH project**” targets Maswar district hospital with secondary health services included surgeries and comprehensive reproductive health. in Amran and 3 health facilities in Al-Mahwit. A mobile team for the IDP camps was also supported which was a crucial need for Huth IDP settlements in Amran governorate which lacked any sort of health interventions since 3 years.

The “**Re-operating 2 health centers in Taiz governorate**” project targeted 2 health centers with primary health care and rehabilitation the HF with furniture and medical equipment.

All the health projects included rehabilitation of the health facilities with procuring the basic furniture and rehabilitating the damaged health facilities thus ensuring their functionality. As an example, rehabilitating the roof of Thula district hospital in Amran governorate which made 50% of the hospital non-functional due to the severe water leak in rain seasons. Now the roof is completely rehabilitated and the hospital is ready to provide secondary health services.

## Expected projects and interventions during 2020

The health program in YDN plans to reach more than 35,000 beneficiaries in 2020. It is planned to extend to 3 new governorates and 7 districts. A contingency plan to respond to epidemics as cholera, seasonal acute respiratory infections (SARI) and dengue fever is a priority. Provision of quality health care is the prime mover for YDN health interventions and the health program is continuously developing its strategies and procedures.

A health project to support 6 health units with primary health care have already been finalized. The project will be located in Kharif and Raydah districts in Amran governorate. The project targets more than 12,000 beneficiaries.





# WASH Program



## WASH Humanitarian Situation in Yemen

As estimated, 16 million Yemenis need humanitarian assistance to establish or maintain access to safe water and basic sanitation and hygiene facilities, out of them 11.6 million are in acute need. Water and sewage networks require increased support to continue providing the minimum level of services. An estimated 38 per cent of Yemen's population are connected to a piped water network, with higher coverage in urban areas (42 per cent). Due to the lack of electricity and revenues, the functionality of these piped networks is depending heavily on support from humanitarian partners. Where piped networks have stopped, people revert to free but unimproved water sources or depend on charity from others, often resulting in irregular and insufficient access to unsafe water sources. With 78 per cent of households suffering from reduced economic status since 2015, only part of the population can afford trucked water. With an estimated 6 per cent of households treating their water at home, it can be assumed that the majority of the population is not able to access safe water for drinking. In the context of the recent cholera outbreak, increased water quality assurance efforts are needed to ensure the population has access to safe water. Poor performance of sewage systems and waste water treatment in urban areas, and weak sanitation and hygiene conditions in rural areas further aggravates the risk of spreading cholera and other diseases. Garbage collection services are primarily provided by local authorities in most parts of the country, but most are barely functioning in the current situation.

## WASH Program in YDN

The WASH program in YDN during the years 2014 to 2019 has many interventions in WASH field within ten Yemeni governorates (Amanat Al-Asemah, Al Hodeidah, Lahj, Taiz, Hadramout, Aden, Al Jouf, Dhamar, Al-Mehweet and Hajjah). More than 35,703 households have benefited from such interventions. These interventions have varied including drilling wells and operating them, establishing permanent pumps, rehabilitation for water sources, construction of 300 dry latrine, distribution of CHKs, jerry cans and ceramic filters, establishing different sized water tanks, providing drinking water to IDPs, monitoring cholera cases, WASH rehabilitation for HFs and community awareness activities. In Taiz governorate, YDN established a local WASH community Team for the most difficult circumstances of war. As a result, (40) tanks were distributed covering all the city's districts and providing water regularly from far and difficult to access areas.

## WASH Projects in 2019

During 2019, YDN implemented 2 projects in the WASH field within 2 governorates; Mahwit and Amran in 4 districts. More than 2000 households have benefited from such interventions.

The "Integrated project in Health, nutrition and WASH" in Milhan district in AlMahwit governorate included the initiation of rehabilitation and maintenance of 10 water sources for affected populations, construction of 10 water tanks with 20 water point and connect pipes for it, construction of 300 dry latrine for SAM cases, distribution of CHKs jerry cans ceramic filters and conduct 60 awareness sessions in hygiene .

The "The emergency cholera response project" included rehabilitation of 10 HF's in Amran governorate, rehabilitation for the roof of Thula hospital , construction of a medical incinerator in Dhi Bin hospital and distribution of hygiene kits for cholera cases.

YDN also distributed 365 consumable hygiene kits for Al-Dhadh camp in Khamir district in Amran Governorate as a response to the WASH cluster – Sana`a hub request .

YDN also conducted WASH assessment for 3 sub districts (Al-Udayn – Bani Hat – Qasa Hlyan) in Al-Udayn of Ibb governorate.

## Expected projects and interventions during 2020

WASH project in Al Udain district of Ibb governorate  
The project is designed to provide a complementary intervention in Bani Hat sub-district of Al Udayn district. The intervention will involve the rehabilitation of the water network, construction of a septic tank for the sewage network that is pouring directly to the valley, garbage collection and disposal, and awareness sessions on hygiene practices.

The WASH interventions were planned to have a sustainable impact and to improve the WASH status for long duration. Those interventions are among the first and second lines response under the cluster's objectives of providing emergency water, sanitation and hygiene services and assistance to highly vulnerable people, and restoring and maintaining sustainable water and sanitation systems, particularly in high risk areas.





# Nutrition Program



## Nutrition Humanitarian Situation in Yemen

The nutrition situation in Yemen remains alarming. An estimated 7.4 million people require services to treat or prevent malnutrition, including 4.4 million who are in acute need. This includes 3.2 million people who require treatment for acute malnutrition: 2 million children under 5 and 1.14 million PLW.<sup>59</sup> Five governorates have acute malnutrition rates that exceed the 15 per cent WHO emergency. The nutrition cluster aims to reduce the prevalence of acute malnutrition among children under five and pregnant and lactating women (PLW) and other vulnerable population groups and expand coverage of nutrition services and remove the barriers that prevent families from using them.

## Nutrition Program in YDN

In the period from 2016 to 2018, YDN had many interventions in Nutrition field within (9) Yemeni districts.

More than 91,000 Individuals have benefited from YDN nutrition interventions.

These interventions included MUAC screening for children and PLW, treatment and prevention of acute malnutrition for children under five and PLW, community awareness activities and incentivizing community health volunteers and health workers in the supported 40 health

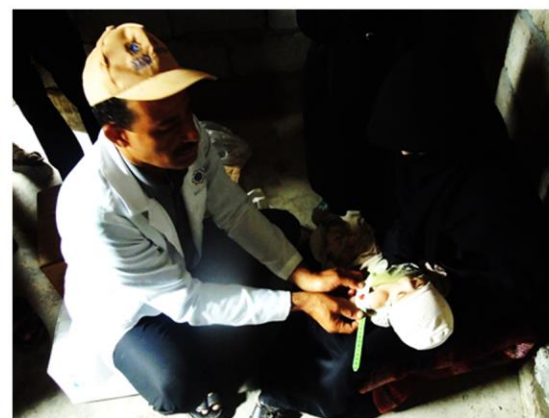

## Nutrition Projects in 2019

YDN is implementing an Integrated Health, Nutrition and WaSH project in Milhan district of Al Mahwait Governorate and Maswar and Huth districts of Amran governorate with providing primary nutrition activities including screening, referring and treating acute malnutrition children under five, and preventive services including provide counseling on infant and young child feeding (IYCF), providing micronutrient powder (MNP) for children under five and deworming drugs.

### Expected projects and interventions during 2020

Nutrition program in YDN plans to scale up the interventions to reach more beneficiaries and expend its geographical interventions and activities to new 2 governorate and 5 districts and new activities including supporting therapeutic feeding centers (TFCs) with world health organization (WHO) and preventive programs including therapeutic supplementary feeding programs (TSFP) and blanket supplementary feeding program (BSFP) with World Food Programme (WFP).

# FSL Program



## FSL Humanitarian Situation in Yemen

Yemen was declared the world's largest humanitarian disaster by the United Nations (UN).

According to the United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA), "An estimated of 24 million people require some form of humanitarian or protection assistance, including 14.3 million who are in acute need. Severity of needs is deepening, with the number of people in acute need a staggering 27 per cent higher than last year.

Two-thirds of all districts in the country are already pre-famine, and one-third faces a convergence of multiple acute vulnerabilities. Almost half of the Yemeni population already lived below the poverty line.

## FSL Program in YDN

YDN has a great experience in food security and livelihood. The number of beneficiaries of our projects is more than 2 million beneficiaries. YDN made several interventions in food security and livelihood sector focusing on food basket and cash transfer programs, we also implemented interventions in livelihood in distribution of inputs in livestock, vegetable seeds, and wheat seeds.

## FSL Projects in 2019

"Food Security Response for most vulnerable and affected households in Al Udayn district of Ibb governorate project" duration( 01/10/2018 - 31/10/2019) ( The project targeted 1500 of the most affected and vulnerable families in three sub-districts (Bani Hat, Qusa'a Halyan, Urdon) in Al-Udayn District of Ibb Governorate with unconditional food cash assistance.

The distribution process was conducted for six consecutive rounds from April to September 2019. Six PDM surveys were also implemented . And the project activities were finished by the implementation of an end-line survey, which showed that the intervention improved the overall food security status of the targeted beneficiaries as HHs with acceptable food consumption scores raised from 14% to 75% of the targeted HHs.

YDN are implementing Emergency agricultural livelihoods support to the most vulnerable households in Al Jawf. project directly target the most vulnerable households with staple crop and vegetable inputs and services, animal health and production inputs and services as follows: 5,400 households with livestock inputs (feed concentrate, mineral blocks and feed blocks), 5,190 households with kits of vegetable seeds and farming hand tools and 1,050 households with improved wheat seed. livelihood assistance in terms of support for and distribution of animal feed, cereal and vegetable seeds and farming hand tools will be provided to a total of 11,390 HHs most vulnerable and food insecure households in Al-Jawf governorates in three affected districts Khabb wa ash Sha'af, Az Zahir, Al Maton .

## Expected projects and interventions during 2020

2020 YDN Plan of Action is to make a significant contribution towards improving food security and livelihood and strengthening the resilience of vulnerable rural and peri-urban households while restoring the agriculture sector of the country. In Food security YDN planned to expand its partnership with WFP and to be included in GFD programme . Furthermore, we are looking forward to implement more than 4 project, Raise the capability to provide emergency response in livelihood ,economic empowerment and cash for work project and cover multiple areas in all governorates. We expected to target more than 5 districts in the targeted governorate.



# Education Program



## Education Humanitarian Situation in Yemen

The war in Yemen affected the lives of the Yemenis, and because of the increased conflict since 2014, the humanitarian crisis that was already present in Yemen has aggravated and resulted in a sharp change in the educational situation in the country. At a time when Yemen was suffering from a chronic situation in the deficiencies of development, in addition to a series of local conflicts, the current level of emergency and its greatest impact on children's education as well as on schools and other educational facilities exceeds what the education sector was ready to deal with. The collapse of the educational system has affected the provision of educational services at all levels, and the irregular payment of government employees salaries has led to a high rate of school closures and affected educational opportunities for children. According to the reports of international organizations working in the education sector, as explained in the 2019 humanitarian response plan; 1.9 million children are out of school, 4.1 million children need help to continue their education

The war in Yemen negatively affected the education sector in general, and not only in conflict areas, but also in areas consid-

## Education Program in YDN

To mitigate the impact of the conflict, YDN education program focuses on rehabilitation of partially damaged schools, rehabilitation of classrooms, rehabilitation of schools' bathrooms and supporting schools with tables, chairs and boards.

Establishing temporary classroom tents to not interrupt the educational process and distributing meals for the students are the emergency activities that YDN have implemented

Other activities include printing the school textbooks, distributing school kits, distributing entertainment kits, distributing teachers kits and training students and teachers on school health programs.

Psychological and health support for students and teachers and other social activities are highlighted and advocated by YDN education program.

### Education Projects in 2019

YDN implemented “*Distribution of school kits in 4 governorate Aden, Lahj, Abyan and Aldhale'e*” were the total beneficiaries of students reached 20,000.

11 districts were targeted as these districts lacked any education interventions and basic services. 107 schools were targeted where they included 20,000 students of different levels. The distribution took into account the differences in ages and levels of education and the school kits were adjusted to the different needs.

Coordination with the ministry of education and governorate education offices was done which facilitated the distribution operations and ensured response to the gaps present in the governorates.

### Expected projects and interventions during 2020

YDN education plan in 2020 is to implement essential activities in education like distribution of school kits, rehabilitation schools and institute, building capacities of teachers, back to school awareness session for students, cash assistance for teachers and establish schools in conflict areas. Conduct partnership with the most supportive donors in education and their partners in UNICEF, INGO and NGOs.

The expected intervention in education sector in 2020 will cover the most affected and in need areas.

# Protection Program



## Protection Humanitarian Situation in Yemen

Protection of civilians remains a major priority in Yemen. More than 17,700 estimated civilian casualties<sup>72</sup> have been verified since September 2015, and thousands more people have been threatened by indiscriminate attacks and violations of international humanitarian law (IHL). An estimated 14.4 million people need protection assistance, including 8.2 million in acute need. Conflict has left more than 3.3 million displaced<sup>73</sup>, including some 685,000 newly displaced since the military escalation along the western coast in June 2018. Catastrophic hunger, disease outbreaks and lack of services due to destruction of vital civilian infrastructure has exacerbated the situation of more than one million people with specific needs. Millions of civilians in 19 governorates are at risk from landmines or explosive remnants of war (ERW). Grave violations against children remain high, following a 51 per cent increase in verified cases of killing and maiming of children compared to the previous year. Urgent needs persist for mine risk education, unaccompanied and separated children, mental health and psychosocial support for children and adolescents

### Gender Based Violence

With the continuing conflict, response to incidents of GBV have increased by 70 per cent compared to last year, despite chronic under-reporting. Sudden and new displacement has increased the

vulnerability of women and girls, with consequent increased needs for multi sectoral services, including expansion of geographical coverage and strengthened capacities for service providers. Critical needs, include timely follow-up and referral, medical assistance psychosocial support, emergency shelter and legal assistance. In addition, training, technical guidance and support are needed to prevent and mitigate GBV risks

### Child Protection

The situation of children has worsened. This year, 4.3 million children are in acute need compared to 3.3 million children last year. Grave violations of children's rights continue to occur including indiscriminate

## Protection Program in YDN

YDN became a partner in the technical working group of gender network in the capacity building taskforce. YDN works to respond to child protection issues, gender and protection within humanitarian response projects for a number of reasons that include reducing risks during the implementation of humanitarian programs, increasing opportunities to access services for survivors, and handling root causes of violence, implementing the standards of accountability to affected people, promotion of women's rights, equality and awareness of the consequences of war remnants.

YDN has many interventions represented in training humanitarian workers on gender, raising awareness of the risks and damages of war remnants in conflict areas and setting up psychological support programs and workshops about the international humanitarian law.

## Protection Projects in 2019

In 2019, there were interventions for protection program activities in the project *“food security response for most vulnerable and affected household in Al Udayn district of Ibb governorate”* funded by YHF. The field team coordinated with the civil status office and conducted a field visit to Urden district to issue identification cards (IDs) as Urden district is one of the remote areas and many of them have no documents. The team separated between men and women at distribution points to ease access of women without crowding with men. The distribution point for women was at Al- Hamza exchange and the distribution point for men was Al-Saify cash exchange. The field team ensured prioritizing elderly and people with chronic illness and lactating and pregnant women.

They made special sunshades in front of cashiers to protect the beneficiaries from the sun blaze and organized the beneficiaries during the process. A dedicated team of women helped organize and arrange female beneficiaries to ensure their protection to receive their assistance with ease.

## Accountability of affected population

YDN is committed towards affected population by including all women, men, boys, girls, people with disabilities and IDPs by following a set of procedures that ensure the two-way communication with communities, leaders and all stakeholders in the field and to ensure involvement and empowerment of beneficiaries and communities in all phases of the projects' cycles.

YDN mainstreams DO NOT HARM principle in project humanitarian activities in which the projects will be implemented with no discrimination in age, gender, religion, ethnic groups, disabled people.. Accountability tools included in all YDN's projects include direct contact with beneficiaries for tracking complaints of any extortion that may negatively affect them. A hot line for complaints and complaint boxes are included in all projects.

Raising awareness of beneficiaries that the activities are only their rights and that it's the duty of the organization to deliver them, ensures that the beneficiaries can easily receive the services with dignity.

## Expected projects and interventions during 2020

YDN will expand coverage areas, integrate the protection principles into all implemented projects, and liaise for partnerships with donors. YDN's documents were submitted to UNHCR, UNFPA, DRC and it is planned to implement independent protection projects.





## Shelter/NFIs/CCCM Humanitarian Situation in Yemen

The conflict in Yemen entered its fifth year in March 2019 and remains the world's worst humanitarian crisis. Consequently, Shelter remains a major humanitarian priority with 2/10 people in need of Shelter/NFI or SMC (Site Management and Coordination) support, with most living in makeshift shelters using inadequate materials to construct their shelters such as plastic sheeting, cardboard, cloths and leaves in areas without adequate access to basic services. In IDP Hosting Sites some 465,000 IDPs live in close to 1,300 Sites, often as a last resort, and are considered among the most vulnerable populations with no means to support more adequate shelter solutions.

Returnees are no better off with at least 10 % with no shelter or settled in makeshift shelters while 6% reside in IDP hosting sites due to multiple factors including damage to their homes, security and safety and limited access to basic services and livelihood opportunities.

There has been an 84% increase in needs from 1.2 M people in 2015 and 24% increase from 5.4 M in 2018 to 6.7 M in 2019. For people with acute needs an increase of 67 % since 2015 or 4.5 M in 2019 an increase of 42% from 2018. The Shelter/NFI/CCCM Cluster target remained at 3 M for 2018 and 2019 with a budget increase from \$195 M in 2018 to \$222 M up 14% in 2019.

## Shelter/NFIs/CCCM Program in YDN

Shelter is essential for people's physical and social protection, dignity, privacy and health. At times, it can save lives. Yemeni Development Network for NGOs (YDN) endeavor to make shelters safe and secure. YDN has been continuing to play leadership role in the shelter sector. During 2014 until 2019 YDN had many interventions in shelter program within (11) Yemeni governorate. These interventions included NFIs distribution and winterization kit distribution. In conclusion, YDN has expertise in assisting and targeting the communities of IDPs the countrywide

## Expected projects and interventions during 2020

The shelter/NFIs/CCCM program in YDN will distribute winterization kits to 700 HH Conflict Affected Displaced Populations in Alkhaniq camp, Mazjar district Marib Governorate. This project is funded by IOM and the agreement has been signed. The implementation of the project will begin in 1st of JAN.

YDN also will provide rental subsidies where appropriate and cash grants to rehabilitate damaged houses to 500 HH conflict affected households in Ibb Governorate in three districts; Al Udayn, Mudhaykhira, and Jiblah districts of Ibb governorate for six months. This project is in the socend allocation which funded by YHF.

YDN submitted a concept note in CCCM to participate in UNHCR's operation in Yemen in 2020 and contribute complementary resources (human resources, knowledge, funds, in-kind, and/or equipment) to achieve enhanced living conditions, protected and ensuring integrated assistance for families living in 14 hosting sites in Damt Districts, Al Dhale'e Governorate and in Abyan Governorate.

However, YDN submitted also a concept note in Shelter/NFIs to participate in UNHCR's operation in Yemen in 2020 and

contribute complementary resources (human resources, knowledge, funds, in-kind, and/or equipment) as well to achieving Distributing household non-food item. To add unique advantage for achieving the desired outcome YDN will target the same beneficiary households through for rental subsidies to 500 HH conflict affected households with the household non-food item in Ibb Governorate in three districts; Al Udayn, Mudhaykhira, and Jiblah districts of Ibb governorate.

### *Smelling Soup Treat Fever*

An old man shows on his hands and facial features years of misery, years of poverty, need and disease. He came to us leaning upon his walking stick, telling us later that he had traveled from his home by his feet. We received him at the cash distribution center, and hardly ever we picked him up to the nearest waiting chairs with the help of the distribution team. He could not stand, so we asked the exchange official to get out because of his health condition and his apparent inability to stand, which is what happened, the exchange official came to him and after he completed the exchange process and received the amount handed over to him. The distribution, a small brochure (introductory leaflet), said what is this: We told him this paper contains ... advice, let your son read it to you. "Oh my son, none can read. Read it to me", he said. Then we explained to him that this help is to buy food for your family and not for your personal expenses. !! He looked surprising to those who say this words

"My son, I weigh the flour, sugar, oil for my house, and a little meat" because when I smell the soup, the fever goes away from my body," he said

my son in the house 10 souls (number of family members), my wife and my son's children are orphans, their father was killed in the war in the unity war and I am the breadwinner and most of them are women. So, for five months I have received the salary and I spent it for them and it still a month then the salary will be cut off, but Generous God is the one who grants you for us today, and he will grants others to us tomorrow. After that he received the money in addition to his ID and the exchange card, and he put them all in a small plastic bag designated for that, then he put the bag in his inner pocket and made sure that his items were in a safe place ... He asked the team to help him to go out of the exchange center .. he was mumbling words and prays to every one who contributes the reach this assistance to him





## ***New born Nama***

In Al Udayn district where YDN is Providing cash assistance to 1500 HHs, and while the distribution of the sixth round was ongoing, one of the indirect benefiting families welcomed a new infant. The

family agreed to name the newborn girl NAMA, which is the Arabic translation of YDN.

When the family were asked about the reason, they commented that it was a gesture of gratefulness to YDN for its efforts.

Unfortunately, this round was the last in the project. This monthly assistance was the last respite for 1500 HHs including Nama's family, who are all going to be in a terrible situation.

Is there still a hope for Nama and the others ?!
