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## Executive Summary

Yemen confronts one of the world's most intricate and devastating humanitarian crises. Amidst this landscape, ONSUR stands out as a vital local actor, distinguished by its strategic vision, deep field expertise, and robust international partnerships. Established in 2018, ONSUR is resolutely committed to a comprehensive humanitarian response that transcends immediate relief, strategically investing in long-term solutions—critical areas like education, economic empowerment, and bolstering community and climate resilience.

Impacting the lives of well over 1.3 million beneficiaries, ONSUR's vital operations span more than 11 key Yemeni governorates. This extensive reach is achieved through the implementation of over 450 targeted projects, delivered in close collaboration with a strong network of more than 40 diverse local and international partners.

Central to its interventions is a crucial nexus approach, effectively bridging life-saving emergency response with forward-looking strategic development. This work is anchored in core values of humanity, transparency, partnership, and sustainability.

This profile serves not merely as an organizational overview; it is a compelling invitation to donor agencies and partner institutions. ## Yemen:

### A Complex Crisis... A Future on the Brink

Yemen grapples with a devastating multi-dimensional crisis, its consequences cascading across intractable conflict, critical food insecurity, a fractured education system, widespread internal displacement, and compounded by escalating climate threats. The figures are stark: according to the United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA, 2024), over 18.2 million people—more than half the population—urgently require humanitarian aid.

Tragically, over 5 million children face life-threatening malnutrition, while more than 3.2 million are denied education, deepening a staggering development gap with severe long-term consequences for Yemen's future.

Compounding this tragedy is the catastrophic nexus of relentless conflict, economic collapse, and environmental degradation. This toxic combination erodes community resilience and threatens to lock Yemen into a perpetual cycle of crisis. Breaking this cycle demands a fundamental shift: interventions must urgently embrace integrated approaches that marry immediate, life-saving relief with pathways to sustainable development.

## The Devastating Nexus:

### Conflict, Economy, and Climate

Yemen faces a perfect storm resulting from the destructive interplay between prolonged conflict, economic collapse, and the escalating impacts of climate change . This convergence erodes community coping mechanisms, exacerbates humanitarian needs, and makes the path to recovery and development exceedingly difficult.

## Profound Impact on Future Generations

The most severe consequences of these multi-layered crises fall upon women, children, and youth in particular. The destruction of the education system, the lack of economic opportunities, increased protection risks, and worsening inequality threaten to create a generation lacking hope and the capacity to build a better future for Yemen.



## The Imperative to Act

Continuing traditional humanitarian aid without addressing root causes and building resilience is a temporary, unsustainable solution. The cost of inaction – failing to strategically invest in education, youth empowerment, climate adaptation, and supporting local solutions – will be exorbitant in the long term, perpetuating the cycle of crisis and dependency. Action now is an absolute imperative.

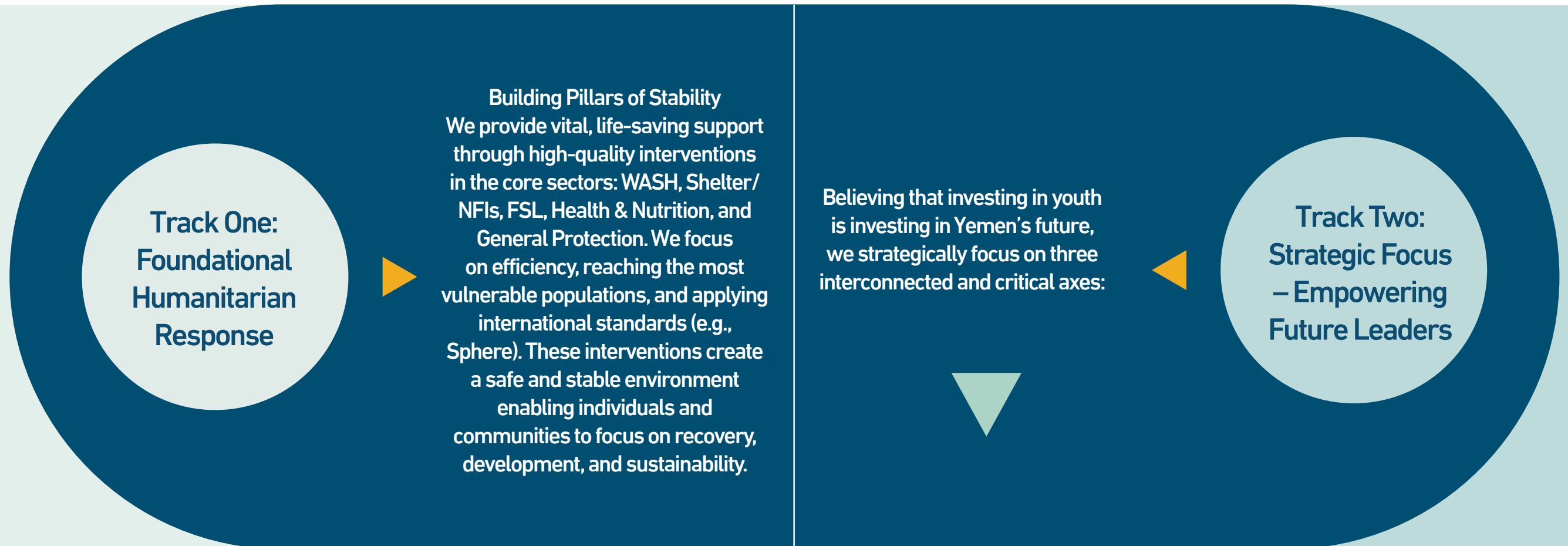

We apply an integrated, dual-track strategic approach that combines meeting urgent humanitarian needs with strategic investments in building capacity for sustainable resilience and recovery:



## Integration and Linkages:

We strive to maximize impact by designing programs that integrate the two tracks and different axes wherever possible, creating comprehensive and sustainable solutions.

## Our Firm Operational Principles:

Community-centeredness and active participation, local capacity building, ensuring quality and effectiveness (Value for Money), striving for sustainability, genuine partnership, applying protection and gender equality principles, and commitment to accountability and continuous learning.

**Quality and Inclusive Education:** Not just providing access, but improving the quality and relevance of education for the future. This includes rehabilitating schools, providing alternative and accelerated learning programs, supporting and training teachers, focusing specifically on removing barriers to girls' education and retention, and integrating life skills, digital literacy, and critical thinking.

**Youth Economic Empowerment:** Equipping young men and women with the vocational and technical skills demanded by the evolving labor market, with an emphasis on "green" and digital skills. We support entrepreneurship initiatives and micro-enterprises, and work to connect youth, especially young women, with decent and sustainable employment opportunities.

**Community and Climate Resilience:** We consider climate action integral to building resilience. We work to raise awareness of climate change risks and support communities and youth in developing and implementing innovative local adaptation solutions (such as sustainable water management, climate-smart agriculture, renewable energy use, biodiversity conservation). We also advocate for supportive external and internal policies for climate action.

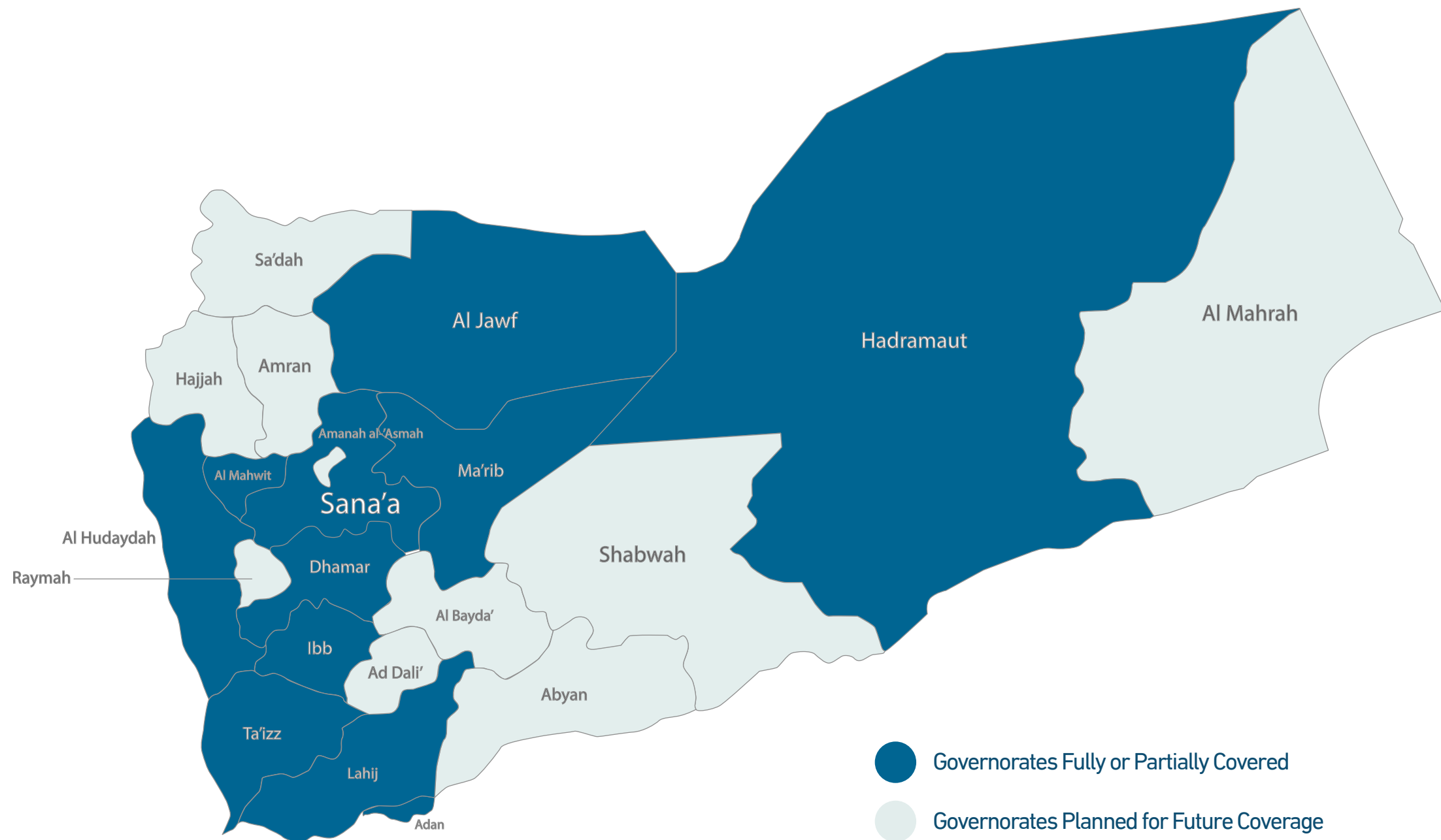


# GEOGRAPHIC COVERAGE:

## STRATEGIC REACH TO THE MOST AFFECTED AREAS

Since its founding, ONSUR has prioritized areas most impacted by conflict, displacement, and lack of basic services, ensuring that humanitarian and development support reaches those most in need.

Our operational expansion is guided by data-driven needs assessments and strategic analysis—not random deployment. This approach has allowed us to deliver measurable, context-specific impact in the most vulnerable and underserved governorates across Yemen.







# Tangible Impact:

## Results of Our Core Humanitarian Interventions

### Health and Well-being through WASH

ONSUR enhanced community health by improving safe water access (constructing/rehabilitating **47** systems) and providing vital hygiene support. Reaching **349,000** people, these WASH efforts contributed significantly to reducing waterborne diseases by approximately **20%** in targeted areas.



### Dignity and Safety

Through its shelter programs, ONSUR has rehabilitated over **170** housing units, constructed **4** new residential structures, and allocated plots of land for displaced families, significantly enhancing their living conditions, dignity, and physical safety in fragile settings.

### Food Security

To address urgent food needs and build resilience, ONSUR has provided food assistance to approximately **82,500** vulnerable households. This included long-term bakery support across **six** facilities, delivering an average of **1,000** loaves of bread daily for three consecutive years, helping thousands of families weather economic and conflict-related shocks.







# Promising Impact:

## Strategic Program Outcomes and Aspirations

### Education

ONSUR works to increase school enrollment and retention, especially for girls, while improving foundational learning for over **20,000** students annually. Its efforts also include rehabilitating **4** education networks and building **5** new schools to expand access to education.

### Climate Resilience

ONSUR actively supports communities in adopting over **30** climate adaptation practices, such as sustainable water management, climate-smart agriculture, and renewable energy use, while systematically tracking their impact on livelihoods and risk reduction.

### Economic Empowerment

Each year, ONSUR targets the economic empowerment of at least **1,800** youth, equipping them with market-relevant skills and supporting pathways to sustainable income through vocational training, entrepreneurship initiatives, and job placement

Every intervention we implement is guided by a results-oriented approach focused on measurable, sustainable impact.

# FACES BEHIND THE FIGURES



## Hiyam – Reweaving Life from the Ruins

When war tore through Taiz, Hiyam lost everything — her husband, her home, and the life she had built. At 40, she was suddenly a widow caring for six family members, including a young son with a chronic heart condition. They took shelter in a partially destroyed house, where damp air worsened her son's health and clean water was a daily uncertainty. Some days, there was no food. Most nights, only fear.

*“There were times I went to bed hungry so my children could eat,” Hiyam says. “I felt powerless — watching my son struggle, unable to afford his medicine.”*

ONSUR's Zero Hunger project changed that. Food vouchers meant she could choose what her family ate — restoring not just nutrition, but dignity. Then came a turning point: training in pastry-making through ONSUR's economic empowerment program. With a starter kit, she began baking from home. Slowly, orders came in. Her small income grew.

That money paid for medicine. It bought school supplies. After four years, her children finally returned to school — smiling, hopeful.

*“The food helped us survive,” she says. “But the skills gave me strength. I'm not just surviving now. I'm rebuilding.”*

Today, Hiyam's pastries support her family and inspire others. She even trains fellow women in her community, sharing the very tools that helped her reclaim her life.



## Marwan – Strength in the Face of Loss

Before the war, Marwan dreamed of saving lives. A young man from Taiz, full of promise and purpose, he set his sights on a future in medicine. But conflict shattered that path. Displaced to Marib, Marwan continued to volunteer — refusing to let war silence his calling. Then, in 2018, tragedy struck. While delivering medical aid, shrapnel tore through his leg, leaving him with a permanent injury.

*“It felt like my future walking alongside patients, running to emergencies, was suddenly impossible,” he says. “How could I pursue medicine if I couldn't rely on my own mobility?”*

ONSUR's Youth Building Program became Marwan's turning point. Through vocational training in computer skills and maintenance, he found a new way forward — a chance not only to recover, but to thrive. With certification in hand and renewed confidence, Marwan carved a different path of service.

He began offering tech support to others in his community — especially youth with disabilities. His injury no longer defined what he couldn't do; it became the reason he chose to empower others.

*“I lost the full use of my leg,” he says, “but not my heart. I found purpose again — and I want others like me to know: we're not broken, we're rebuilding.”*

Today, Marwan is more than a survivor. He's a mentor, a voice of encouragement, and a symbol of what's possible when youth are given tools, trust, and training. His journey reflects ONSUR's belief that recovery doesn't just mean healing wounds — it means restoring dignity, direction, and dreams.

A notable feature of ONSUR's approach is that many of its field interventions are designed and led by Yemeni women, who play a critical role in planning, implementation, and engagement with affected communities. This reflects the organization's belief that women's leadership is central to building resilient and equitable futures.

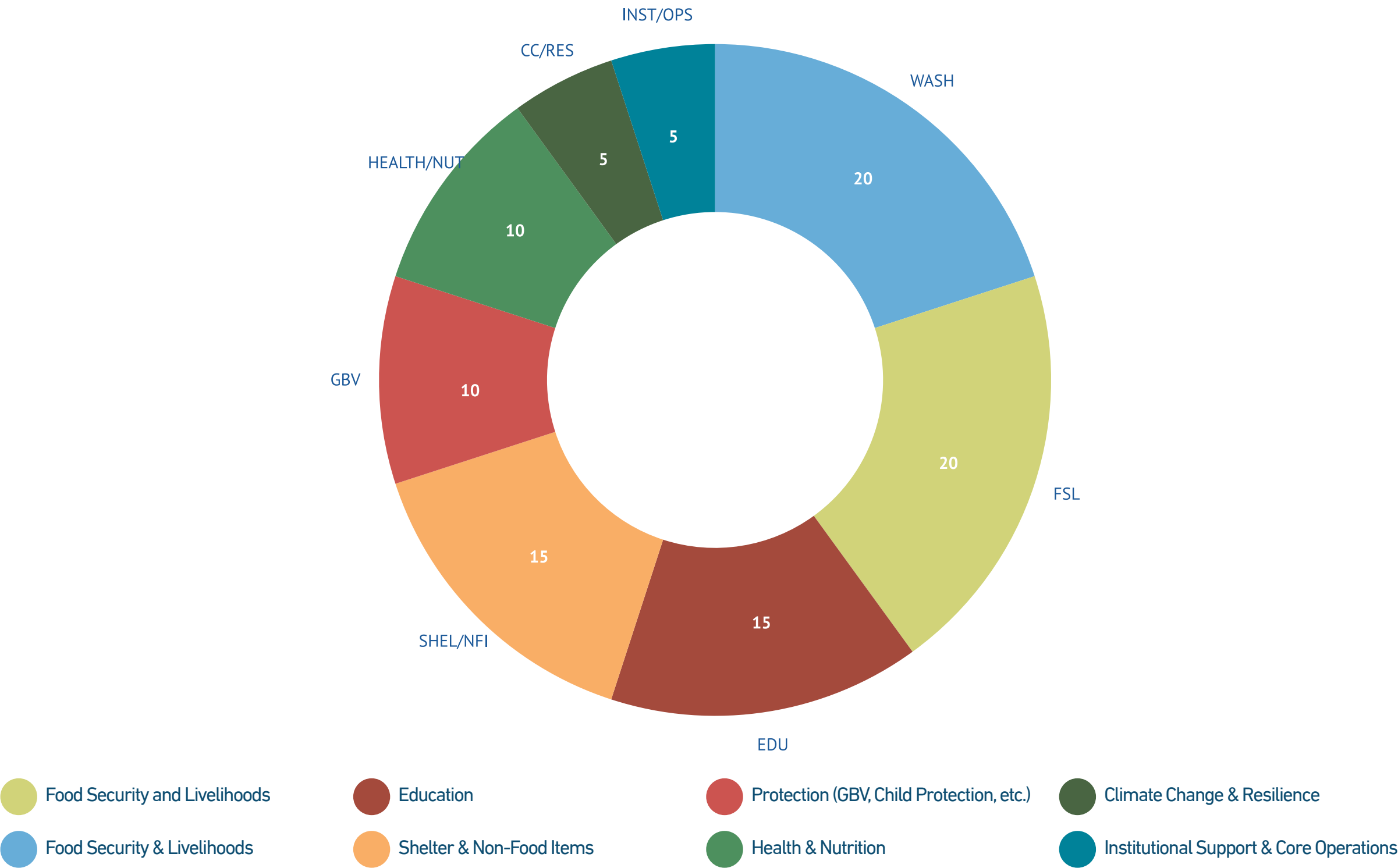
## FINANCING OUTLOOK AND PROJECTIONS (2025–2029)

*BUILDING A DIVERSIFIED, INCLUSIVE, AND RESILIENT FUNDING ECOSYSTEM*

### Funding Overview (2020–2024)

Between 2020 and 2024, ONSUR successfully mobilized an estimated **USD 8.5 million** in funding to support its humanitarian and development interventions across Yemen. These funds were allocated in alignment with strategic priorities and sectoral needs, and were sourced from a diverse portfolio of international and bilateral partners.

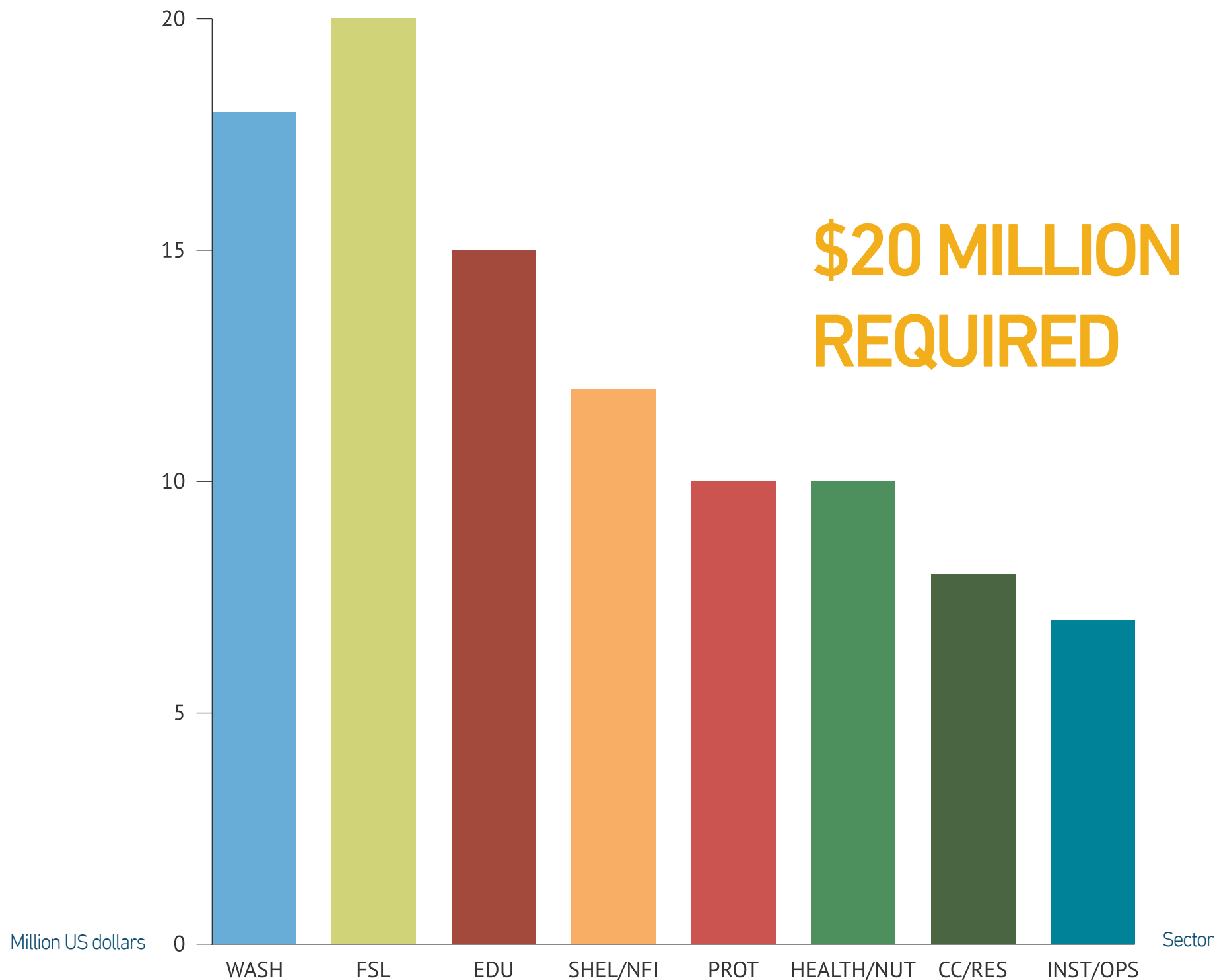
This period marked a significant achievement for ONSUR in establishing a strong financial foundation, enabling the delivery of impactful programs in WASH, food security, education, protection, shelter, health, and climate resilience. Additionally, a portion of funding was directed toward institutional capacity building, a critical enabler of effective, accountable, and scalable interventions.



# Future Funding Needs (2025–2029):

## A Strategic Investment Framework

ONSUR estimates its funding needs for the upcoming five-year strategic plan (2025–2029) at approximately USD 20–25 million, aligned with sectoral priorities outlined in the previous financial overview. These projections are grounded in field-based assessments, national development gaps, and trends in donor engagement. To support this vision, detailed project proposals will be developed for each sector upon donor request. These proposals will include clear operational budgets, performance indicators, and robust impact measurement mechanisms to ensure transparency, accountability, and return on investment.



## Resource Mobilization Strategy

ONSUR is adopting a multi-pronged resource mobilization strategy that combines innovation, partnership diversification, and financial transparency to ensure the sustainability and scalability of its impact:

- Expanding strategic, multi-year partnerships with UN agencies, international organizations, donor governments, humanitarian and thematic funds, regional institutions, and both public and private sector actors in Yemen.
- Engaging the private sector in funding community-based initiatives and fostering local innovation.
- Developing a digital financial transparency platform, providing real-time reporting and performance dashboards to donors and stakeholders.
- Demonstrating value for money and long-term impact, positioning ONSUR not merely as a humanitarian implementer, but as a catalytic investment partner.



# THE COST OF INACTION:

## HUMAN AND ECONOMIC RISKS

Failing to invest in local capacity, quality education, and youth empowerment risks perpetuating Yemen's cycle of aid dependency, unemployment, and displacement. Evidence from global development institutions illustrates the gravity of this risk:



**Every child** deprived of primary education represents a loss of up to **USD 10,000** in lifetime productivity  
(World Bank, 2023)



Each year of **delayed youth employment** opportunities is linked to a **5% increase** in **extremism** and **migration rates**  
(UNDP Yemen, 2024)



**Lack of climate** adaptation could **double the cost of natural disasters** in Yemen within a decade  
(UNEP, 2023)



Economic **disempowerment of women** can shrink national economic growth by up to **25%**  
(IMF, 2022)

Thus, ONSUR's interventions are not merely program expenses; they represent high-return development investments—vital not only for Yemen's recovery, but for regional and international stability.

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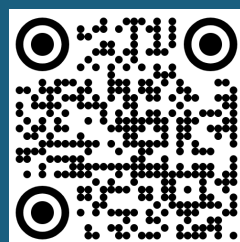

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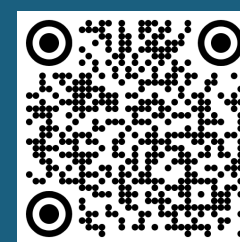
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
